

Won't You Be My Neighbor?

Many people have watched *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*. Fred Rogers was on the show. This show taught children about the world. Mr. Rogers was kind. He showed boys and girls how to get along with others. He taught them to share. He taught them to care for one another. He told kids to talk about how they feel.



Fred Rogers was born in 1928. He went to college to learn music. He went to work in 1954. He worked for a television station. He wrote for a show called *The Children's Corner*. He also did the puppets. He then started work for the show *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*. This show was a big deal.

He always began the show the same. He would put on one of his sweaters. He would sing the song, "Won't You Be My Neighbor?" Rogers wrote the song for the show. He would then talk about the show. Rogers would think through things that are hard. This taught kids how to get along with others. It also taught them to deal with how they feel. He made kids feel good.

Fred Rogers also did other work. He wrote the shows. He wrote close to 200 songs. There were about 1,000 episodes of *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*. The last show was in 2001. He received several awards. One of his sweaters is at a museum now.

Rogers wrote books for children. The books help kids with hard parts of life. You can find a new show on PBS. *Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood* is a show made by the Fred Rogers Company. The show is like *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*. Children today can still learn from Rogers. They can learn how to get along in our world.
